Strong finish to summer fundraising

Schreiber had a strong summer of fundraising, holding two successful fundraising events that combined brought **more than \$150,000** to the center, money that will go directly to support Schreiber's array of therapy and educational services.

Schreiber's 32nd Annual **Rubber Duckie Race**, which this year featured a virtual final event due to COVID-19, **generated more than \$100,000 in revenue** through ticket sales and sponsorships. Schreiber sold **more than 19,000 tickets** for the Duckie event this year, the most in recent memory. The top prize of \$10,000 went to P. Alan Loss, who will donate back \$4,000 of his prize.

The 38th Annual **Softball Weekend's** more than two dozen participating teams **donated more than \$50,000**, despite playing on a new date and at a new location.

From the Desk of James DeBord, Schreiber President

An unforgettable year winds down

We are approaching the end of 2020. Finally. What a year it has been. A global COVID-19 pandemic that is still with us. Businesses forced to close, and thousands of our

neighbors unemployed. Schools faced with impossible choices.

Here at Schreiber, we had enormous challenges when the pandemic hit. Our in-person visits stopped almost completely, even though we remained open. Our fundraising events were postponed or canceled.

We're still here, though. And that's mainly thanks to so many of you. We had a record-setting Phonathon campaign. The Stabler Foundation awarded us a \$250,000 matching grant, one that required us to raise an equal amount as a match. We did that in about 11 weeks. We sold the most tickets in recent memory for our Rubber Duckie Race, even though we couldn't do our festival or the duck drop at Lancaster County Park.

We are grateful for all of that support, but significant challenges remain. We still need your help. The Extraordinary Give, Lancaster County's celebration of nonprofits and philanthropy, is coming up November 20. Your willingness to go above and beyond for Schreiber has made the Give one of our most important fundraising events, and because of the uncertainty of what lies ahead it will be even more important for us this year.

First your donations help pay for the work our therapists do. Every day, for dozens of families, the team at Schreiber is making lives better. It's hard work, but it's work that brings a lot of joy, too. We know that because so many of our staff have been here working with kids for 30 years or more. You can meet the members of Schreiber's 30-Year Club in a story on page 3.

How do we know we're making lives better? Just look at the hand prints we have on the walls around our building. Every hand print is a sign that a kiddo reached a goal or completed their work and was discharged. Gabriel Morales, one of this year's Schreiber Ambassadors, put his hand print on the wall this summer. Read his story on page 3.

We can't do what we do without the help of generous supporters like you. Or like Harold Gainer. Harold was among the original Lancaster Fraternal Order of Police members who organized the first Softball Weekend fundraiser in 1992. He was still running the event as recently as 2018, before he started having health problems. Harold passed away in September, but he leaves behind a remarkable Schreiber legacy: Through his efforts working with the FOP, Softball Weekend has raised nearly \$2 million for Schreiber. 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WE REACHED OUR STABLER MATCH GOAL!

In June, Schreiber learned it would receive a \$250,000 matching grant from the Donald B. and Dorothy L. Stabler Foundation to fund general operations. Schreiber raised the required \$250,000 match by the end of August. Our sincere thanks to everyone who provided a gift to Schreiber that helped us reach our goal. That includes Duckie ticket buyers, Softball Weekend players and people

who just felt moved to donate for no reason other than to support what we do. The **\$500,000** represents a huge investment in helping Schreiber navigate the COVID-19 pandemic, which will continue to affect operations at Schreiber for the foreseeable future.

Schreiber bags partnership with Lancaster EMS

Schreiber is excited to launch a new partnership with Lancaster EMS to provide the ambulance service with 125 sensory bags that first responders can use on calls with children with autism or other behavioral or anxiety issues.



Marisa Seubert, marketing and development coordinator at Lancaster EMS, brought the idea to Schreiber over the summer. Two of the EMTs had experience responding to calls involving children with anxiety, and they saw a need for having tools in their ambulances that would help keep kids calm.

Schreiber received a \$5,000 grant from the Clark Family Foundation that paid for the bags and the supply of sensory items, including headphones, stress balls and necklaces.

"I loved the idea," said Angie Rice, director of therapy services. "Anybody in the community should be aware of helping these kids when they are in a challenging (emergency) situation."

Fully equipped bags should be available on select ambulances marked with a special Sensory Prepared decal by Dec. 1.

"Schreiber wants people to know the needs these kids have so that they can be OK in any situation," Angie said. "It's another piece of the work we do to help families."

An Ambassador Story: Gabriel Morales

Gabriel Morales turns 6 this month. He was 3 when he started with Schreiber due to his autism diagnosis. It's amazing what can happen in three years.

When he started at



Schreiber, he couldn't draw a line to make letters. He had difficulty speaking and making himself understood. He had a lot of sensory issues.

And now?

It took a lot of hard work with Maddy Sova for speech therapy and Sarah Terry for occupational therapy to catch up, but he did it. Which is why he was discharged from speech and OT this summer.

"He's basically on target for kindergarten," says his mom, Evelyn Morales. "You see him in a classroom, you wouldn't know how far behind he was."

Evelyn says he can make all his letters, and can say all of them. She can understand everything he says. "He has a huge vocabulary." He's so much better at adapting to changes in his environment, whether it's going to the grocery store or playing in grass.

"I'm so thankful for everything Schreiber has helped him with," Evelyn says. "I was very nervous about kindergarten, but he's doing great."

In Memoriam



Harold Gainer

Harold Gainer, a longtime Schreiber supporter who helped organize the first Schreiber softball fundraiser back in 1982 and ran it for more than 35 years, passed away Sept. 11. Harold's work on Softball Weekend, with the support of the Red Rose Lodge #16, Fraternal Order of Police, raised close to \$2 million for Schreiber.

Chris Erb, president of Red Rose Lodge #16, remembered Harold in an email to Schreiber: "Harold will be deeply missed by all who knew him. His leadership and guidance, wisdom, quirkiness, and so many other traits and talents he possessed will be forever remembered and cherished. I would ask that you please keep (his wife) Bobbi and the rest of Harold's family in your thoughts and prayers during this very difficult time as they cope with Harold's death."

Harold proudly served his country in the United States Marine Corps and was a Vietnam Veteran. He was a 28-year East Hempfield Township police sergeant and a 23-year security supervisor for Lancaster General Hospital.

Harold's memory will live on as a result of his service to the community and his dedication to the children of Schreiber.



Bailey Welton

Bailey Welton, a 2019 Schreiber Ambassador, passed away Aug. 19. She was born with spina bifida and a host of other physical challenges, but she had a light that was plain to see, whether she was tooling around in a new wheelchair or smiling in front of a roomful of people at our Gala.

One of her Schreiber therapists once said: "She is consistently happy and a joy to work with during therapy... Bailey has had many therapists in her time at Schreiber and continues to interact with everyone that has been in her life."

Schreiber President James DeBord put it more simply: "Her smile, kindness and positive nature as she worked so hard made not only Schreiber but the world around her a better place."
