From the Desk of James DeBord Schreiber President

Back to the drawing board for expansion

"...we'll need your help

more than ever."

A year ago at this time, in the thick of the worst part of the pandemic, I talked with you about how Schreiber was managing. We adjusted our business operations on

the fly. We saw an outpouring of generosity from the community. And we survived.

I want to thank all of the folks who supported us through the unprecedented challenges of the past 18 months. Your donations to Phonathon, your purchase of Rubber Duckie Race tickets (the

next one is next month, by the way), your gifts during the Extraordinary Give, and so many more acts of charity – they all helped us end our fiscal year in a better financial position than we could ever have imagined possible.

I also want to thank our staff. Their dedication and commitment as they came to understand the new reality for delivering our life-changing services was nothing short of miraculous. They found ways to help kids progress during telehealth sessions. They reduced in-person sessions to 30 minutes to allow time for cleaning in between – and still helped kids make progress.

Now, we are ready to write Schreiber's next chapter.

We have hired all the therapists we physically have room for. Their schedules are again just about completely full. If we're going to get back to our core mission, to provide services for every child who needs them, we have a new goal ahead of us.

We need more space.

After postponing our plans for more than a year, we are now ready to re-launch a capital campaign to fund what will be a \$7.5 million expansion of our main building. We are again talking to the engineers, architects and fundraising consultants who will help make this dream a reality. We want to add three stories on the end of the building facing Good Drive, with the first floor providing 7,000 square feet of new therapy space.

As we're raising the money for our work in the future, we will

continue to need your help to provide dollars for operations right now. The demand for our services shows no evidence of slowing down. If anything, the pandemic has put a spotlight on the need to

invest even more in a whole range of support services for children, particularly for children with special needs.

In short, we'll need your help more than ever.

So, as you enjoy the rest of your summer, the baseball, beach trips and backyard barbecues, please take a minute to think about Schreiber's place in this community and how you can be involved. An Ambassador Story: Jalaya Cooper

Jalaya Cooper, who turned 11 in January, was diagnosed with hypotonia (low muscle tone) at the age of 7 months. She has received therapy to treat that and help her overcome a series of developmental delays. She receives all three therapies at Schreiber, working on fine motor skills in occupational therapy; core strength, balance and coordination in physical therapy; and improving her use of words, both in speaking and with a communication device. She lives with her parents, Alex Cooper and Sandra Myers, in Lancaster.

Four questions with Lisa Christoffel

Lisa Christoffel retired in June, ending a career at Schreiber and Easter Seals that dated back to the 1970s, with a break in the early '80s to raise her children. She became interested in speech language pathology as a teenager because of a friend. She would

go on to get a master's degree in speech therapy from West Chester University, and her second stint at Easter Seals and then Schreiber would continue for more than three decades.

We talked to Lisa recently about her many years of service to Schreiber.

Where did the idea to pursue a career in speech-language pathology come from?

I had a really good friend who had done the Peach Festival, a benefit event for the Cleft Palate Clinic. This was when I was a teenager. You found out a lot about the clients who went to the Cleft Palate Clinic. (After that), I really wanted to go into the Peace Corps. I really wanted to help people. But you're not going to make a whole lot of money in the Peace Corps. And you had no idea where you would go. But I wanted a career to help people.

What do you remember about the early days?

There were two therapists in each department, speech, OT and PT. I used to see a lot of preschoolers. The preschool kids had a diagnosis. We had a ton of kids with spina bifida, Down syndrome. We had outpatient clients, too, but the majority were kids who came for preschool.

Why retire now?

I had been there long enough, (trying) to keep up with the technology was overwhelming for me. I'm realistic about it. The 20-some year olds I worked with can do teletherapy and use apps and devices, and I can't do that. My back and my ability to stay focused on technology forced me to say, "OK, you've done this for 42 years, you need to do something else." It was hard, but there were too many things nudging me (to retire).

What do you think you'll miss about Schreiber?

I'll definitely miss the families and the kids. And certainly the staff. Everybody is so supportive of each other. Schreiber really is a unique place to work. It is a family, and that's what was really hard for me to leave.


